



By the 1970s, teenagers in the UK spend about £800 million per year on themselves - mainly on clothes, make up, and entertainment. Music, advertising and fashion became more influential than parents. The term 'raging against the machine' became popular, which basically meant fighting back against the people in charge (parents, teachers, politicians, in fact, anyone telling you what to do).

"As a 16 year old, may parents forbade me to go out alone with a boy, to ride on the back of a motor scooter, to drink, to go to a club where the Rolling Stones played... So one night I deliberately broke every one of their rules.

I went on the back of my boyfriend's scooter to the club, listened to the Stones and got drunk, and [had sex] in his house before going home. It was just adolescent rebellion against being controlled, though that was part of it.

There was something keener, fresher in the in the air. A sense that we were going to do things our way, and that there were a lot of us who rejected not just our parents what they their values represented." It is important to note that no all teenagers rejected social expectations. Most teenagers didn't drop out and only a tiny minority of teenagers fought each other on the beaches of the south coast. Most student protests were law-abiding.

Perhaps what changed most was not teenagers, but the way the media reacted to them?


